International Meeting Centres meet-up

February will see the first ever **global online meet-up of Meeting Centres** from across the world.

On February 1st at 8am GMT, people running and attending Meeting Centres for people and families affected by dementia from as far and wide as the UK, Japan, Australia and Zimbabwe are invited to dial in to meet and talk with each other about what they do and their experiences where they are.

Meeting Centres are a form of community-based support that originated in the Netherlands. ADS spearheaded Meeting Centres in the UK and will be hosting this world-wide session.

Items to be discussed include updates on the situation with Meeting Centres in each country, as well as a discussion of key challenges going forward. We will report back on how it goes!

ADS at the 17th UK Dementia Congress

In November (I know it already seems like a long time ago!) ADS colleagues, students and friends delivered a plethora of presentations at the UK Dementia Congress 2023, from the opening address to the final session. Here's a brief overview of what we got up to at the two-day event in Birmingham.

To kick things off, <u>Dr Shirley Evans</u> made the opening address of the conference, saying how proud the Association for Dementia Studies (<u>ADS</u>) was to be Academic Partner of the event and giving some of our highlights from the past year. She then introduced two of our PhD students who talked briefly about their studies:

- Leisure and everyday life with dementia A symposium led by Chris Russell and former ADS colleague Becky Oatley, along with Frances Isaacs and Dory Davies. Chris also had a poster on display about the topic
- What can help or hinder community support groups in keeping going long-term? Thomas Morton
- 'I felt like I belonged somewhere': Extra Care Housing for people with dementia Teresa Atkinson
- How can books change the world of dementia care and support? ADS Emeritus Professor Dawn Brooker and Keith Oliver as co-editors of the 'Reconsidering Dementia' book series

The Hennell Award for Innovation and Excellence in Dementia Care


In memory of the late Brian Hennell, this award celebrates the achievements of an individual or team who have shown their ability to implement positive change for people living with dementia, and is open to anyone who has attended a course facilitated by ADS.

The winner for 2023 was the **Alive Meeting Centres** team, who run Meeting Centres for people living with dementia in and around the Bristol area. The judging panel were especially impressed by the innovative and excellent standard of the work, and how barriers were overcome using a range of means, including energised and imaginative leadership.

Louise Spencer, Alive Meeting Centres project manager, said: "I am delighted that our Meeting Centres have been recognised by the University of Worcester. We encourage people to remain active following diagnosis. Thanks to our professional, skilled and passionate staff, our members have built strong relationships and supportive communities that helps them continue to live independently and enjoy life. We also have loads of fun!"

Record numbers on our Post Graduate Certificate in Dementia Studies!



It's an exciting time of year as we welcome a new cohort onto this fully online course. We have a mix of new students just joining us and those who have already completed other module(s), many from different backgrounds, so it's a great opportunity for everyone to share experiences and learn from each other.

This year we've had record numbers of new students, a testament to the quality of the course, which won a **University of Worcester Teaching Award** in 2022. The team aim not just to teach person-centred dementia support, but also take a person-centred approach to teaching, focussing on the needs and aspirations of the student. Course Leader Dr Chris Russell said: "Our aim is to support you in your learning, so you feel more confident and empowered to lead positive change in practice."

Three modules are just getting under way: *Expert Practice in Delivering Person-Centred Dementia Care; Engagement and Empowerment in Dementia Studies;* and *Dementia in the Family Context.* There are more modules in September, and we will be accepting new students in the autumn also.

Our **Championing Physical Activity for People Affected by Dementia** course is also underway again for the new year. This is a short online course combining live teaching sessions, self-directed learning activities and the opportunity to put learning into practice and reflect on it with the rest of the group. It's a course we've run a few times before with great student feedback, and we're thrilled that we are able to run it again for a new cohort.

We're also aiming to publish a journal article about the course and how it was developed, in the near future. In addition, Year 2 Graphic Design students from the University of Worcester's School of Art are taking part in a competition to design an 'infographic' to communicate the research related to this innovative course. Watch this space for further developments!

If you support people affected by dementia but aren't sure how to offer physical activities, or if you work in a sport or leisure setting but don't feel confident to support people affected by dementia, this course could help.
